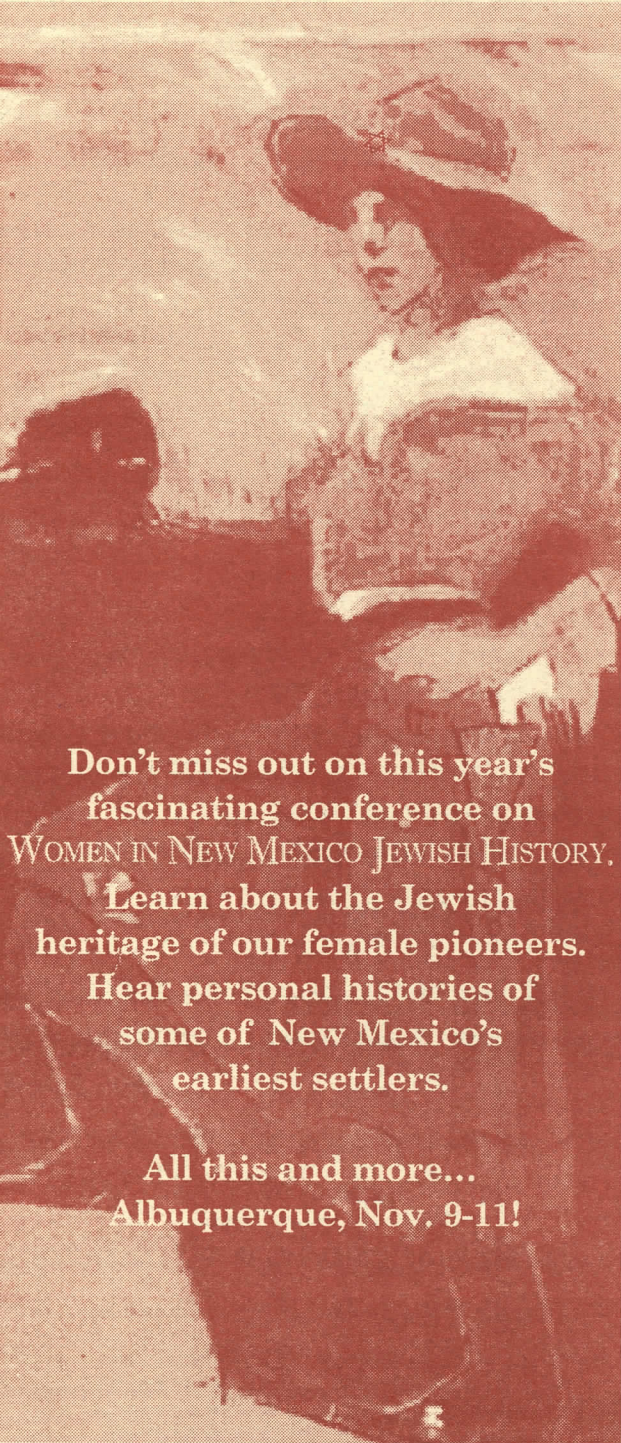
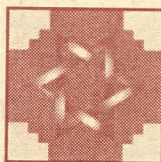

NEW MEXICO JEWISH HISTORICAL SOCIETY 14th ANNUAL CONFERENCE
WOMEN IN NEW MEXICO JEWISH HISTORY

The Fourteenth Annual Conference of the New Mexico Jewish Historical Society will be held at the Sheraton Old Town Hotel in Albuquerque, November 9-11, 2001. This year's theme is "Women in New Mexico Jewish History."

Scholars from Colorado and New Mexico will examine the role Jewish women have played in the development of New Mexico society over the course of the past four hundred years. The speakers will address the pioneer women who came to New Mexico along the Santa Fe Trail in the mid-1800s as well as the contributions of crypto-Jewish women in the colonial period through the twentieth century.

The conference begins Friday evening, November 9, with dinner followed by Eulogiam Carrasco, whose roots can be traced back many generations in the Albuquerque area. Ms. Carrasco will share her personal observations on her family's Sephardic Jewish heritage. The Saturday morning program features presentations on various aspects of crypto-Jewish society. Dr. Robert Ferry will examine the role played by Blanca Méndez de Rivera and her daughters within the converso community in the mid-seventeenth century followed by Dr. Stanley Hordes who will discuss the life of Doña Teresa de Aguilera y Roche. Dr. Janet Jacobs will conclude the presentation by sharing recently published research of women who assert a crypto-Jewish heritage.

Saturday afternoon, the Conference participants have the option of electing a tour of Jewish sites in and around Albuquerque.

Sunday morning, Albuquerque author and journalist Sharon Niederman will share anecdotes based on diaries, letters and other original accounts by nineteenth and early twentieth century pioneer women. This will be followed by a lecture from folklorist Melanie LaBorwit, director of the Las Vegas City Museum. Ms. LaBorwit will relate the life of Rachel Lowenstein, who came across the Santa Fe Trail in the mid-nineteenth century and settled in Mora.
