Exploring the History of the Jewish Experience in New Mexico

The fascinating story of the Jews of New Mexico is part of a larger historical puzzle. One piece involves tracing the path of the Jews who fled the Iberian Peninsula when the upheaval of the Spanish Inquisition shattered their lives in the 15th century. Forced to outwardly renounce their religion, they traveled to the New World where some of these Jewish families kept their secret faith and traditions alive for more than four hundred years.

Another piece of the puzzle examines the family histories of young German and Polish immigrants who sought opportunities for a new life away from the constraints and turmoil of 19th-century Europe. Their skill in learning languages allowed them to cross cultural barriers. Their talent for cultivating business arrangements on the frontier enabled them to help transform the region from a barter economy to a mercantile economy. Eager to put down roots, these Jewish pioneers established a community that continues in New Mexico to this day.

From Taos to Carlsbad, from the 16th century to the present day, the history of the Jews in New Mexico is engaging, unexpected, and ongoing...

Educational and Community Programs

Archive and Library
