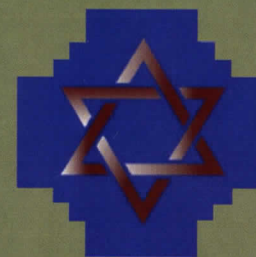

2. You must be an organizational member of HSNM or become a member.
3. Make arrangements directly with the speaker as listed on the websites.
4. After the event, fill out event completion form and return to HSNM.
5. HSNM will pay the speaker honorarium and no other form of compensation may be offered. Host organizations may offer meal or other assistance. NMJHS collaborates with the Historical Society of New Mexico, (HSNM), www.hsnm.org.
6. Organizational members may invite two speakers per year.
